How the two main GCARD3 days - Wednesday 6th and Friday 8th - will be organised

The main GCARD3 program will be organised around 5 key themes, with clear outcomes outlined for each, as well as a set of lenses related to the SDGs - looking at what we are aiming towards and how we can best get there - that will be applied to make the content relevant to current global challenges and priorities (see table below). There will be 6 sessions of 1 hour under each Theme, for a total of 30 one hour segments.
